It's time to spice up your speech!



Do you always use the same old words when speaking? Repeatedly using only a handful of simple words every day can limit your ability to express exactly what you want to say. **Learning more words not only makes you sound more intelligent, it makes your communication more interesting and engaging.**

Today, in honor of the upcoming Halloween holiday, we'll explore 13 dark, spooky and evil adjectives you can **add to your vocabulary to enrich your speech** and express subtle nuances in meaning. Don't be fooled – these words aren't just for Halloween. You will hear them all year round in a variety of contexts.

Surprisingly, there are an abundance of adjectives in English to describe darkness, spookiness, evil and death. Surely, you're familiar with the everyday common words like terrible, horrifying, scary and frightening.

Some of these words are quite similar, but by spending some time working through these activities, **you'll have a good handle on the minor distinctions between them.**

Before tackling this list of words, let's start by assessing your current knowledge of dark, spooky and evil words.

- 5 = Very familiar (I can use it confidently in conversation)

Adjective	Definition	Example
ominous	giving the impression that something bad or unpleasant is going to happen	There was an ominous silence when the boss entered the room.
creepy	causing an unpleasant feeling of fear or nervousness	The old house had a creepy atmosphere.
eerie	strange and frightening	An eerie light shone from the window of the abandoned house.
ghastly	extremely unpleasant or bad	The victims suffered ghastly injuries.
somber	dark or dull in color; serious, sad and without humor or entertainment	They wore somber black clothes to the funeral.
sinister	seeming evil or dangerous; making you think something bad will happen	There was something sinister about his smile.
macabre	connected with death or violence in a way that is strange, frightening or unpleasant	The story is a macabre tale of murder and madness.
gruesome	extremely unpleasant and shocking, and usually involving death or injury	The newspapers carried gruesome pictures of the dead bodies.
morbid	too interested in unpleasant subjects, especially death	She had a morbid fascination with death.
menacing	threatening; suggesting that something unpleasant is going to happen	He gave me a menacing look.
grisly	causing horror or disgust	The police discovered the grisly remains of two bodies
dreadful	extremely bad, unpleasant or annoying	The weather was dreadful .
ghoulish	interested in death or disaster; grotesque or horrifying.	The abandoned house was decorated with ghoulish figures for Halloween.
